

The purpose of this data is to provide WSD families and staff with a transparent summary of COVID-19 positive cases and exposures resulting in exclusion from school. This data is updated daily and historic data is updated weekly.

COVID-positive individuals will be isolated for a minimum of 10 days and must have a release from the St. Charles County Department of Public Health in order to return to school. Data for exposures identifies individuals who have not tested positive, but have been identified as close contacts through contact tracing. For staff, this could include nonschool exposures, self-reported interaction with a positive case, or staff who have symptoms and they are waiting for test results. For students, this number only reflects those who were identified as close contacts from exposure at school, on the bus, or at a school event or activity.





WSD Providing Free Meals with Covid Funds

The Disrict continues to provide free meals for all students through December 31, or until available federal funding runs out. The meals are being provided regardless of eligibility as a result of the extension of waivers by the US Department of Agriculture (USDA) related to the Seamless Summer Option program. This includes children ages 1-18 who reside in the Wentzville School District boundaries but are not enrolled in a WSD school.





WSD Educators Receive Emerson Excellence in Teaching Award

Two WSD educators have received a 2020 Emerson Excellence in Teaching Award, joining an elite group of teachers from across the St. Louis region. Rene Wilson, second grade teacher at Journey Elementary and Lauren Farrelly, French teacher at Liberty High School, have been recognized for their outstanding and innovative work in the classroom on behalf of students, their passion for teaching, and their impact on student learning.





WSD Tech Director Wins MBU Alum Award

Greg Lawrence, Director of Technology for the Wentzville School District, has received the 2020 Vocational Excellence Award from Missouri Baptist University. The award recognizes an alum who is showing excellence and achievement in their field and who demonstrates promise of further distinction.

Lawrence graduated from MBU in 2003 with a degree in music education and also holds a Masters in Informational Technology in Education. He has worked for the WSD since 2003, first as a computer and music teacher, then as a district technology coach, and since 2016, he has served as the district's Director of Technology. Lawrence is a Google Cloud Certified Administrator, Google for Education Certified Innovator, and a co-leader for the Google Educator Group of Eastern Missouri.





Two Teachers Named Regional PE Teachers of the Year

Two Wentzville School District physical education teachers, Ami Schulte of Timberland High School and Jennifer Werner of Wentzville Middle School, have been named SHAPE America Central District Physical Education Teacher of the Year for their respective grade levels by the Society of Health and Physical Educators (SHAPE) America. Schulte and Werner were both selected among state teachers of the year to represent the Central District which includes nine states: Colorado, Iowa, Kansas, Minnesota, Missouri, Nebraska, North Dakota, South Dakota and Wyoming. They are both now eligible for SHAPE America National Physical Education Teacher of the Year at their grade level.





Liberty High School Junior Earns First Place at Missouri Cross Country Championships

The Wentzville School District is proud to announce that Liberty High School junior Ally Kruger took first place at the Missouri State High School Activities Association (MSHSAA) Cross Country Championships in the Girls Class 5 race held Saturday, November 7, at Gans Creek Cross Country Course in Columbia, MO. Timberland High School senior Trevor Peimann took second place in the Boys Class 5 race.

Kruger's winning time of 18:03.1 broke the previous record for Gans Creek of 18:08.6 set in 2019. With this win, she also became the firstever State Champion in cross country running for Liberty High School and the first female to place first at state for cross country in the Wentzville School District. Kruger has been running competitively since she was eight years old, but began working with her coach, Toby Glavin, back in the eighth grade. "Ally has been a stud runner from the day she joined our team," Glavin reported. "As a freshman, she finished in 8th place at the state meet – the fastest freshman that day in any

class. This year, she was very process-focused, so unbelievably relaxed and in the best shape she has ever been!" Dr. Edgar Nelson, Principal of Liberty High School shared, "Ally is the definition of a scholarathlete, a young woman of character and a tremendous competitor. We are incredibly proud that Ally will be known as the first female Cross Country Champion for the Wentzville School District."





WSD Celebrates Veterans Day

The WSD takes pride in hosting special celebrations across the District each year on Veterans Day to honor our veterans' service and sacrifice. In lieu of large scale celebrations this year, students and staff came up with new ways to pay tribute to the brave men and women who have served our country. Peine Ridge Elementary honored community veterans with a Veterans Day Drive-thru Parade. Each veteran that passed through received a warm greeting from the students, a cup of coffee, a cookie, and a handmade goodie bag containing a letter from a student thanking them for their service. At Lakeview Elementary, student Jacob Markezich made a remarkable suggestion to set up a White Table display outside the school cafeteria, a tradition that honors veterans' sacrifice - especially those missing in action or held as prisoners of war. Across the District, other schools created and shared videos showcasing their beloved veterans, made cards and wrote letters to express their gratitude. We wrapped up Veterans Day 2020 with a video shoutout to our employees and their families who are currently serving, or who have served, in the U.S. armed forces. Thank you for your service!

No Hunger Holiday in the WSD

WSD students held turkey drives this week to benefit No Hunger Holiday and local families in need. For the tenth consecutive year, Holt students collected the most frozen birds in the District in what has become a friendly competition between local high schools. Wentzville Middle families assisted Holt and in the end, the Indians collected 424 turkeys. Liberty students collected 90 turkeys, and Timberland

students, assisted by Boone Trail students who held a penny drive and raised \$625 to purchase turkeys, collected 200 birds in the effort. District-wide, a total of 714 turkeys was collected.

The turkeys went to No Hunger Holiday, a non-profit program that works to put food on the tables of families in need. The program was started in 1990 for St. Charles County families and has expanded to include Lincoln, Warren, Montgomery and St. Louis County families as well. Ten years ago, No Hunger Holiday started promoting the competition among area high schools to encourage young people to get involved in the effort. 


Liberty Assistant Principal Helps Save a Man's Life

Liberty High School is one of two schools that served as polling places in the WSD on election day and the quick action of one of our own may have helped save the life of a voter. Liberty Assistant Principal Dr. Matt Kiesel was checking to ensure election officials had everything they needed to accommodate voters before the doors opened early that morning when someone came running in asking if there was a

defibrillator in the school because someone had collapsed outside. Dr. Kiesel guickly secured the AED device located near the nurse's office and ran to help. According to Lake Saint Louis resident Kenny Nowling, he was speaking with a man in line when he suddenly collapsed. Nowling shared that an off-duty Lake Saint Louis police officer and his wife, who is a nurse, quickly jumped in and performed CPR on the gentleman while another person went in search of the defibrillator. Dr. Kiesel arrived and assisted with administering the AED and the man regained a pulse as paramedics arrived to step in. According to Kiesel and Nowling, the gentleman was alert and talking with paramedics as they closed the doors. "Thank you to the Lake Saint Louis police officer, his nurse and angel of a wife and Dr. Kiesel for acting so calmly and methodically and saving this man's life!" shared Nowling on social media. "You all are real life SUPER HEROS! What a perfect time for all of us to remember that, regardless of our political affiliations, we are all human beings living in the greatest country in the world."

WSD Connectivity Update

Your students and our teachers rely on the internet and many additional online resources to support teaching and learning in the WSD every day. We understand now more than ever, the importance of that need, as we are teaching in an ever-changing environment. When the internet becomes unavailable, everything stops in our classrooms and the learning is immediately disrupted.

This school year, we have experienced network connectivity issues beyond our control, system performance issues, and inaccessible onlines services, and because of these obstacles, we know that you have experienced frustration and technology fatigue. While it may only be two minutes, we know the interruption it causes in your teaching and the learning of your students is much greater.

To help students navigate when issues like this occur, we recommend you discuss with your child the following:

- Set an expectation that when there is a glitch, students should remain online and wait for the teacher to return. Additionally, if the students encounter a glitch on their end, they should log back in as soon as it has been resolved and re-join their class.
- Set an expectation that when students are unable to connect, that they send an email to their teacher(s) indicating what happened and seek out information about what needs to be completed since class was missed.

 Communicate that at any time in the 80-90 minute period of class time, students should expect to be online. If a connectivity issue occurs that lasts longer than a few minutes, students should expect that teachers will call them back to class through an email.

We can't guarantee there will never be an interruption in the future no one can - it's technology. But we want you to know the WSD Tech team is incredibly dedicated and passionate and it is our joy to ensure that you and your students have the best technology experience in the Wentzville School District.
