

Wentzville School District Celebrates the Class of 2019 with Three Ceremonies



The WSD held three separate high school graduation ceremonies for the Class of 2019 at the Family Arena in St. Charles on Sunday, June 2. More than 1,100 seniors from Holt, Liberty and Timberland high schools walked across the stage to receive their diplomas. This marks the third graduating class from Liberty High School, which opened to freshman in the fall of 2013. The WSD is the fastest growing school district in Missouri in the 21st century, adding hundreds of new students every year since 2000. A fourth District high school is being built in Wentzville to accommodate the continued growth and it is scheduled to open for the 2021-2022 school year.

Collectively, WSD graduates have been awarded over \$20 million in scholarships from institutes of higher learning and over 300 graduates qualified for A+ scholarships to Missouri community colleges or vocational/technical schools. "We are extremely proud of our 2019 graduates and all they have accomplished," said Superintendent Dr. Curtis Cain. "We are confident that they have the foundation and tools they need to prepare them for the next step in each of their individual journeys and that they will continue to excel and make their families, the Wentzville School District and our community proud."

WSD Unveils New Logo



The Wentzville School District has unveiled a new logo for the start of the 2019-2020 school year. The logo had not been updated since 2009 and District leadership felt the time was right to update the logo in conjunction with the District's new strategic plan, which was approved by the Board of Education in May. "As we continue to grow and focus on providing cutting-edge opportunities for our students, we wanted a visual representation of excellence for the WSD," said Superintendent Dr. Curtis Cain. "The new logo, coupled with our new five-year plan, defines who we are as a District and our commitment to providing a first-class education for all students."

A variety of logo concepts were designed by WSD Marketing Director Derrick Docket who presented the concepts multiple times over the course of the past school year to District leadership, the Comprehensive School Improvement Plan Committee, and students in the WSD marketing and Center for Advanced Professional Studies programs. The concepts were adjusted based on feedback from those groups before two concepts were shared with the District's 2,400+ employees this spring. Last month, all stakeholders were then invited to weigh in on two final concepts. Over 74 percent of respondents overwhelmingly chose the banner concept which represents excellence and a focus on all students. Specifically, the color blue represents the District's history and is a unifying color for the WSD; silver/gray represents balance and neutrality related to the District's commitment to all students; and the banner represents excellence and high standards.

The new logo will be phased in to minimize cost to the District, explained Mr. Docket to the Board of Education last month. The logo is used primarily in digital spaces, which can be updated immediately at no cost, and items with the logo will only be replaced as needed.

Boundary Committee Update

The 2019 WSD Boundary Committee met twice in May to begin work on new boundaries for the District. The meetings were facilitated by Dan Schmidt from MGT Consulting Group who has also been



hired to conduct the latest demographic study for the District.

The committee, which includes parents, community members, staff representation and a member of the Board of Education, are utilizing the latest demographic data to create new attendance areas for District elementary, middle and high schools. WSD voters approved Proposition E last year, a \$125 million no-tax increase bond issue, which included building a new high school that will open in 2021 and a new elementary school which is scheduled to open for the 2020-2021 school year.

At the last meeting on May 21, Mr. Schmidt presented two scenarios as a starting point for the committee to review for elementary, middle and high school boundaries. The scenarios were organized in a north/south and east/west fashion crafted by MGT to begin the conversation. The

committee worked in groups to review each scenario and react with their initial impressions as to what they liked and areas that could be improved. All of the feedback was compiled and reviewed and revisions are currently being made to the scenarios based on the committee's work and input. It is important to note that the scenarios presented at the May meeting were a starting point and they have already been adjusted. The next Boundary Committee meeting is scheduled for August 27 from 4:00-6:00 p.m. in the library at Holt High School.

The Boundary Committee meetings are open to the public to observe only; the meetings are work sessions and do not include an opportunity for public comment. However, stakeholders are welcome to email committee members who represent a building with questions or you can email the District at info@wsdr4.org.

This fall, once the committee has landed on a draft boundary scenario, parents, staff, students and community members will have an opportunity to make comments, ask questions and make suggestions through a series of community forum meetings. The Board of Education is scheduled to vote on the new boundaries at the December 19, 2019 meeting.

"We understand changing schools can be difficult and very personal, but it is something we have to address frequently in our District given our growth," said Chief Communications Officer Mary LaPak. "We are confident the Boundary Committee will work within the established criteria and carry out its task with diligence; mindful of the impact new boundaries have on students and families."

The WSD is proud to announce that six students won first place medals at the Missouri State High School Activities Association (MSHSAA) Track and Field Championships held



Saturday, May 25. Liberty High School senior Nolan Bone won first place in the Class 4 State Championship held at Washington High School in the Pole Vault, with a personal record of 15'9". Holt High School freshman Allen Bublitz won first place in the Class 5 State Championship held at Battle High School in the Para Shot Put with a throw of 6'; and Liberty freshmen Allison Kruger, Adrienne Rockette, Karlie Wooten, and Megan Venturella won first place in Class 4 in the 4x800 Meter Relay with a time of 9:32.60, earning the first state championship in Track & Field for Liberty High School, which opened in 2013. Nolan won his event later in the day and he made history as the first male state track and field champion for his school.
