

The WSD is pleased to announce that 125 students from Holt, Liberty, and Timberland High Schools have qualified for Advanced Placement (AP) Scholar Awards. Five WSD students (three from Liberty, one from Timberland and one from Holt) received the highest distinction: National AP Scholar Award. New Demographic Study Suggests Significant Growth will Continue

The Wentzville School District could add up to 5,000 new students over the next decade according to projections in a new demographic study released by MGT Consulting Group. The findings, which indicate the District could top 22,000 students over the next 10 years, were shared with the Board of Education by MGT Project Director Dan Schmidt at the August 15 board meeting. The report's key findings include that since 2009, WSD enrollment has increased 38.57% across all age groups with grades 9-12 experiencing the most growth during that time at 49.39%. The report also states that although the population of females of child-bearing age has slightly decreased across the District, the future school age population (under 5) has increased. <u>Read more</u> about this on the WSD Website.

Boundary Update

The 2019 WSD Boundary Committee met this week to review two sets of draft scenarios that were updated based on committee comments and suggestions from their last meeting in May. The committee chose to move forward with one set of scenarios that emphasized a balanced utilization of space across all schools in the WSD. During the month of September, we are asking all stakeholders to weigh in on these draft scenarios so the committee can further develop the new boundaries in October and November before making a final recommendation to the Board of Education. Please note: these scenarios are approximately 60% complete. The committee will take the public's feedback from the online forum and the Community Forum meetings to make additional adjustments in October and November before a recommendation is made to the Board of Education in December. The boundaries will not be finalized until they are approved by the Board of Education.

In the coming days, parents will receive an email with links to the draft scenarios and the online forum in order to comment and make suggestions. The online forum will be open throughout the month of September and will be shared on the website and social media as well.

We also encourage all stakeholders to plan to attend one of the three Community Forums scheduled during the month of September:

Tuesday, September 10 at Frontier Middle School from 6:00-8:00 p.m.

Wednesday, September 11 at the WSD Administrative Center from 11:00 a.m. - 1:00 p.m.

Monday, September 23 at South Middle School from 4:00-6:00 p.m.

Liberty Graduate Earns Perfect Score on ACT

Liberty High School graduate Nawal Cheema has earned the highest possible ACT composite score of 36. Nationally, while the actual number of students earning the top score varies from year to year, on average, only around twotenths of 1% of students who take the ACT earn a 36. Among test takers in the U.S. high school graduating class of 2018, only 3,741 of more than 1.9 million students earned an ACT composite score of 36.

WSD Ranked in Top 20 in Missouri by School Info Website

The WSD is the 20th best school district in Missouri, according to the <u>latest rankings released by niche.com</u> in August. Holt (#40), Liberty (#32) and Timberland (#41) are all ranked in the top 50 high schools in the state (out of 504). Frontier Middle made the list of the top 50 middle schools (#42) and Discovery Ridge and Green Tree Elementary were ranked in the top 15% in

Timberland Sophomores Compete to Earn Spot on USA Baseball Team

Timberland sophomores Lewie Sisay and Anthony Fumagalli are not only representing the city of Wentzville and their high school on the baseball diamond; they could soon be representing the whole country for USA Baseball. They were in Cary, NC, last weekend competing in the National Team Identification Series (NTIS) in order to get an invitation to the National Team Development Program (NTDP) next year.

Scouts for USA Baseball travel the country looking for kids who will ultimately form USA Baseball's 18U (18 and under) Team; you might recognize some who've played for the team, such as MLB All-Stars Matt Holliday, Bryce Harper, and Clayton Kershaw. USA Baseball scouts chose Fumagalli and Sisay to represent the Midwest region (from 11 states) on 30man teams in their age groups (Fumagalli is on the 15U, while Sisay is 16U). The process begins in their respective regions (there are six regions) and there can be anywhere from 100-500+ kids that try out for the regions and age groups. Then, if you're named to one of the age group region teams, you travel to Cary, where there are roughly 200+ kids in each age group from all across the nation who are trying to earn a spot on a national team program the following year. Link Crews Help Freshmen Acclimate to High School

More than 1,300 members of Holt, Liberty, and Timberland's freshmen classes teamed up with high school upperclassmen at Freshman Orientation as part of Link Crew, a program aimed at helping students with their transition to high school. More than 300 upperclassmen from the schools' junior and senior classes greeted freshmen and welcomed them to their new school as part of the program.

Link Crew creates a structure that connects every incoming freshman with an upperclassman from the first day of high school and continues throughout the whole year. These upperclassmen serve as mentors and encourage freshmen to participate in school events and activities, concentrate on the importance of academics and bonding with the whole student body. This, in return, creates a positive and spirited community culture that is driven by students themselves.

WSD Summer STEM Camp Video

From July 8 through July 18, more than 400 students were at Discovery Ridge Elementary participating in the 2019 WSD STEM Camp (watch the video on WSD YouTube). It was a summer enrichment camp for kids entering kindergarten through sixth grade. Classes were designed and implemented by WSD teachers from all over the District, and ranged from Novel Engineering (solving problems that characters encounter in stories) to LEGO Robotics. Also highlihgted in the video was a "Movie Magic" class, where students made short stop-motion films that were uploaded to YouTube (link is below). Though learning retention is being fulfilled through these classes, it's just as important that our students are having fun while learning through these hands-on, engaging lessons and activities. WSD Summer Journey Program and Credit Advancement/Recovery Courses



The WSD offered several Summer School programs for incoming Grades K-8 and high school students - free of charge to any student enrolled in the District. At Liberty High, more than 600 students took advantage of both credit advancement and credit recovery classes. For our students in elementary and middle school, the Summer Journey program engaged them in core subjects - with fun, hands-on activities driving the lessons. More than 2,200 students participated this year in Summer Journey at six schools - Duello (473), Prairie View (454), Lakeview (353), Stone Creek (403), Wabash (412) and Frontier Middle (116).
